All patients who are eligible will be invited for their flu & Covid 19 vaccine during August.



Flu vaccines cost the surgery in the region of £36,000 per year, so please support your surgery and book your flu appointment today!

FLU & COVID 19 CLINICAL RISK GROUPS AND OTHER RISK GROUPS THAT WILL BE ADMINISTERED AT THE SURGERY FOR PATIENTS:

- Chronic respiratory disease: Asthma that requires continuous or repeated use of
 inhaled or systemic steroids or with previous exacerbations requiring hospital
 admission. Chronic obstructive pulmonary disease (COPD) including chronic
 bronchitis and emphysema; bronchiectasis, cystic fibrosis, interstitial lung fibrosis,
 pneumoconiosis and bronchopulmonary dysplasia (BPD). Children who have
 previously been admitted to hospital for lower respiratory tract disease.
- Chronic heart disease: and vascular disease Congenital heart disease, hypertension
 with cardiac complications, chronic heart failure, individuals requiring regular
 medication and/or follow-up for ischaemic heart disease. This includes individuals
 with atrial fibrillation, peripheral vascular disease or a history of venous
 thromboembolism.
- **Chronic kidney disease:** Chronic kidney disease at stage 3, 4 or 5, chronic kidney failure, nephrotic syndrome, kidney transplantation.
- Chronic liver disease: Cirrhosis, biliary atresia, chronic hepatitis.
- Chronic neurological disease: Stroke, transient ischaemic attack (TIA). Conditions in
 which respiratory function may be compromised due to neurological or
 neuromuscular disease (for example polio syndrome sufferers). Clinicians should
 offer immunisation, based on individual assessment, to clinically vulnerable
 individuals including those with cerebral palsy, severe or profound and multiple
 learning disabilities (PMLD), Down's syndrome, multiple sclerosis, dementia,
 Parkinson's disease, motor neurone disease and related or similar conditions; or
 hereditary and degenerative disease of the nervous system or muscles; or severe
 neurological disability.

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- **Diabetes and adrenal insufficiency:** Type 1 diabetes, type 2 diabetes requiring insulin or oral hypoglycaemic drugs, diet-controlled diabetes. Addison's disease, secondary or tertiary adrenal insufficiency requiring steroid replacement.
- Immunosuppression: Immunosuppression due to disease or treatment, including patients undergoing chemotherapy leading to immunosuppression, patients undergoing radical radiotherapy, solid organ transplant recipients, bone marrow or stem cell transplant recipients, people living with HIV (at all stages), multiple myeloma or genetic disorders affecting the immune system (for example IRAK-4, NEMO, complement disorder, SCID). Individuals who are receiving immunosuppressive or immunomodulating biological therapy including, but not limited to, anti-TNF- alemtuzumab, ofatumumab, rituximab, patients receiving protein kinase inhibitors or PARP inhibitors, and individuals treated with steroid sparing agents such as cyclophosphamide and mycophenolate mofetil. Individuals treated with or likely to be treated with systemic steroids for more than a month at a dose equivalent to prednisolone at 20mg or more per day (any age), or for children under 20kg, a dose of 1mg or more per kg per day. Anyone with a history of haematological malignancy, including leukaemia, lymphoma, and myeloma and those with systemic lupus erythematosus and rheumatoid arthritis, and psoriasis who may require long term immunosuppressive treatments. Some immunocompromised patients may have a suboptimal immunological response to the vaccine.
- Asplenia or dysfunction of the spleen: This also includes conditions such as homozygous sickle cell disease, hereditary spherocytosis, thalassemia major and coeliac syndrome that may lead to splenic dysfunction.
- Morbid obesity: Adults with a Body Mass Index ≥40 kg/m².
- Pregnant women: Pregnant women at any stage of pregnancy.
- Household contacts of people with immunosuppression: Individuals who expect to share living accommodation on most days (and therefore for whom continuing close contact is unavoidable) with individuals who are immunosuppressed.
- Carers: Those who are eligible for a carer's allowance, or those who are the sole or primary carer of an elderly or disabled person whose welfare may be at risk if the carer falls ill.
- Children: All children aged 2 or 3 years on 31st August 2024.
- **Frontline healthcare workers:** Those without a workplace occupational health scheme.

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NEW RSV VACCINE

From 1 September 2024, those who turn 75 and those age 75-79 will be eligible for a free vaccine to protect them from Respiratory Syncytial Virus (RSV).

RSV is an infectious disease of the airways and lungs. RSV infection often causes symptoms similar to a cold, including:

- Cough
- Sore throat
- Sneezing
- A runny or blocked nose

It can also make you become wheezy or short of breath and lead to pneumonia and other life-threatening conditions. There is no specific treatment, and most infections will get better by themselves. However, every year thousands of older adults need hospital care for RSV, and some will die. RSV can be more sever in people with medical conditions such as heart or lung disease or a weakened immune system.

Patients who turn 75 during 2024/25 will be invited in for their vaccine the month they turn 75.

Patients who are already 75-79, we will be inviting you for your RSV vaccine shortly.

The reason why we ask patients to book a routine appointment at this time is so that we can effectively manage the incoming telephone traffic, so patients are not waiting in a long queue.


